On 25<sup>th</sup> January, the DfE's School and College Performance Tables were published with validated data. The Academy recorded a Progress 8 score of 0.70, placing it in the top 6% of schools nationally.

## **Pupil Success**

#### STUDENT LEADERSHIP TEAM



The Student Leadership Team (StLT) started the term by delivering an assembly to Year 10 pupils about the role of a Prefect and how they can apply to become a Prefect. A total of 84 applications have been received for the 44 positions available. As part of the selection process, all applicants have completed a trial duty this half term, supported by current Prefects and the StLT.

After the February half term, Prefects will be shortlisted for the new StLT. These pupils will be invited to attend an interview with the current StLT and Academy staff will also have an input into decisions on the composition of the new StLT. Once the new StLT team is in place, the remaining Prefects will be chosen against a rigorous criteria, including their completed application form, trial duty and feedback from staff. The new cohort of Prefects will then release the current Year II to enable them to attend GCSE intervention sessions.

Over the last 8 years, the Academy has competed in 6 county finals and been crowned county champions in 5. This year, the Academy entered the National Cup for the first time and is now officially recognised as one of the top 8 teams in the country. A great achievement by all those involved – well done girls!

#### YEAR 9 ROAD SAFETY



During the Autumn Term, Student Voice feedback raised concerns about pupils' safety when using bikes to and from the Academy. As a result, the StLT arranged a series of workshops which

#### YEAR II OLYMPIC PARK TRIP



On Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> February, 37 intrepid Year II geographers headed to Stratford, London, to investigate the impact of the Olympic Park regeneration on the environment.

First stop was John Lewis for the private viewing gallery. This enabled the pupils to listen to a commentary on the regeneration and then take a unique tour to the restricted roof top gardens where the first environmental surveys were completed. For some, the heights were too much, but most enjoyed the panoramic views of the capital.

We were then lucky enough to have the opportunity to meet one of the historians from the Central Library who provided us with an insight into the area, the history of the industrial development and its impact on the environment. The highlight for many was to see the original 1700s and 1800s maps, brought especially from the archives to illustrate how much Stratford has changed.

Next stop was Carpenter's Lock and then onto White Lane, which holds the title of 'the most graffitied road in Europe'. It certainly didn't disappoint, but did strike a stark contrast to the Olympic Park.


